Students enter this programme at level 6. Students must have completed at least 200 law unit credits (120 at Level 4 and at least 80 credits at level 5) on a LLB (Hons) course before entry onto this programme. Students are not normally allowed to enter this programme unless they have successfully completed all of the Foundations of Law subjects at levels 4 and 5*.

Students are required to complete a Legal Research Project unit and <u>five</u> additional optional units. Students must undertake at <u>least two</u> of those optional units in law subjects**.

Students must undertake a law based Legal Research Project*** with a media/ creative industry theme. The Legal Research Project unit provides students with the opportunity to reflect upon and undertake subject matter that is related to any relevant work based learning experience. In the alternative, students may choose to undertake the 40 credit Dissertation*** unit as an option choice.

AIMS OF THE PROGRAMME

This programme aims to develop graduates who:

- have the necessary legal knowledge and skills base to complete the academic stage of legal training
- have the ability to appreciate complex texts and assimilate complex information, deal with multifaceted problems
- can demonstrate knowledge, understanding and critical awareness of theories, principles and values of law.
- have the ability to apply concepts in a wide range of areas in either a legal or non-legal environment (including areas concerning the media and creative industries).
- have intellectual independence to undertake self-directed legal research in locating and applying sources of law.
- have highly-developed interpersonal skills and able to communicate both orally and in writing
- are able to manage their own personal development and lifelong learning
- demonstrate the law student's skills and qualities of mind in section 2.4 of the QAA Subject Benchmark Statement 2015.
- have knowledge, understanding and critical awareness of contemporary issues (both legal and otherwise) concerning the media and creative industries.

ALIGNMENT WITH THE UNIVERSITY'S STRATEGIC PLAN

This programme aligns with Bournemouth University's new Strategic Vision (BU 2025) of inspiring learning, advancing knowledge and enriching society. It provides our students with an outstanding legal education which is informed by the Department's research and enriched by its wider focus on the media and the creative industries. It also prepares the students for work in the legal professions or other graduate employment (including the media and creative industries).

The Faculty of Media and Communication delivery planning supports teaching which benefits from research of international excellence and expertise in professional practice to enable the delivery of research and practice led and informed teaching.

LEARNING HOURS AND ASSESSMENT

Bournemouth University taught programmes are composed of units of study, which are assigned a credit value indicating the amount of learning undertaken. The minimum credit value of a unit is normally 20 credits, above which credit values normally increase at 20-point intervals. 20 credits is the equivalent of 200 study hours required of the student, including lectures, seminars, assessment and independent study. 20 University credits are equivalent to 10 European Credit Transfer System (ECTS) credits.

As a general rule, time devoted to assessment should normally represent approximately 25% of the student learning time for a unit (i.e. 50 hours for a 20-credit unit), leaving the rest for specific programme-related activities, including lectures, seminars, preparatory work, practical activities, reading, critical reflection and independent learning.

STAFF DELIVERING THE PROGRAMME

Students will usually be taught by a combination of senior academic staff with others who have relevant expertise including – where appropriate according to the content of the unit – academic staff, qualified professional practitioners, demonstrators/technicians and research students.

ADMISSION REGULATIONS

The regulations for this programme are the University's Standard Undergraduate Admission Regulations.

Applicants from Bournemouth University International College programmes which have approved articulation routes must meet the minimum entry requirements in terms of course average and English requirements as stipulated by Bournemouth University.

However, these regulations must be interpreted (and disapplied if necessary) in order to ensure the status of the degree programme as a Qualifying Law Degree. The Solicitors' Regulation Authority and Bar Standards Board have very clear requirements for a Qualifying Law Degree. Relevant provisions which must be taken into account include those relating to the content of the Academic Stage and the Credit Transfer Rules.

Students seeking to become barristers would be required to comply with the Bar Standard Board's requirements. Some of these requirements differ to BU's Standard regulations e.g. students are required to have passed units with no more than three attempts.

WORK BASED LEARNING (WBL) AND PLACEMENT ELEMENTS

Optional placement in the professions, industry, business or in a placement relevant to law, politics, history or media which is broadly defined to include political parties, charities, NGOs, public relations departments, lobbying and campaigning groups, radio stations, local newspapers, internet news providers, and activists websites. Exemption is possible for those who have comparable work experience. 30 weeks minimum comparable work or study abroad can also meet the placement criteria.
