AIMS OF THE DOCUMENT

The aims of this document are to:

- define the structure of the LLM in International Commercial Law programme;
- specify the programme award titles;
- identify programme and level learning outcomes;
- articulate the regulations governing the awards defined within the document.

AIMS OF THE PROGRAMME

The volume of international commerce has increased dramatically since 1945 as product development, business initiatives and the policies of national, regional and international institutions have brought access to new and varied markets. At the same time, improved technology (such as containerisation of goods and electronic commerce) and new perceptions of tradable assets (such as bankers' credits) have profoundly affected commercial practice. Commercial expectations and imperatives have put strain on all legal systems, and there is an increasing tendency toward internationally agreed reform.

The LLM International Commercial Law programme draws primarily upon the common law tradition, but the programme is intended to give the widest possible perspective through groundings in international economic law and contemporary economic and financial context. The programme is designed to give the student an understanding of the dynamics of international commerce, a common law perspective of the legal regulation of institutions and transactions, an appreciation of the problems associated with competing national jurisdictions and a critical awareness of corporate, intellectual property and tax law. It has two compulsory units in both semesters focussed on core commercial law topics which would be expected for such a specialisation. Students are, however, able to choose 4 more units in relation, to corporate, intellectual property, taxation and cyber law to create a unique selection and expand their knowledge and expertise in further fields of law.

In summary, this programme aims to develop graduates who:

- Possess a clear, systematic and critical body of knowledge at the forefront of international commercial law.
- Have an ability to critically evaluate the latest insights and research in international commercial law, as well as an ability to evaluate and apply established techniques of research and enquiry.
- Can demonstrate a clear ability to engage in self-directed and scholarly research, through which
 they will use the knowledge and skills they have gained to create their own hypotheses, and data
 with which to evaluate them.
- Can act autonomously in planning and implementing at a professional level, and can communicate their conclusions clearly to specialist and non-specialist audience.
- Utilise a wide range of transferable skills and competencies that will enable them to operate effectively in their future career, their own personal development and lifelong learning.

ALIGNMENT WITH THE UNIVERSITY'S STRATEGIC PLAN

This programme aligns with Bournemouth University's new Strategic Vision (BU 2025) of inspiring learning, advancing knowledge and enriching society. The Faculty of Media and Communication delivery planning supports teaching which benefits from research of international excellence and expertise in professional practice to enable the delivery of research and practice led and informed teaching and prepares students for work in the legal professions or other graduate employment. In addition, many units cover elements relating to the UN Development areas such as of Lifelong Learning (UNSG 4), Innovative and Sustainable Industry (UNSG 9), and Sustainable Patterns

of Production and Consumption (UNSG 12)—and encouraging students to consider their responsibility as both professionals and citizens for shaping the world they will leave behind.

LEARNING HOURS AND ASSESSMENT

Bournemouth University taught programs are composed of units of study, which are assigned a credit value indicating the amount of learning undertaken. The minimum credit value of a unit is normally 20 credits, above which credit values normally increase at 20-point intervals. 20 credits is the equivalent of 200 study hours required of the student, including lectures, seminars, assessment and independent study. 20 University credits are equivalent to 10 European Credit Transfer System (ECTS) credits.

The assessment workload for a unit should consider the total time devoted to study, including the assessment workload (i.e. formative and summative assessment) and the taught elements and independent study workload (i.e. lectures, seminars, preparatory work, practical activities, reading, critical reflection). Assessment per 20 credit unit should normally consist of 3,000 words or equivalent. Dissertations are distinct from other assessment types. The word count for a dissertation is 15,000 words recognizing that undertaking an in-depth piece of original research as the capstone to a degree is pedagogically sound.

STAFF DELIVERING THE PROGRAMME

Students will usually be taught by a combination of academic staff supplemented with colleagues who have relevant expertise including – where appropriate according to the content of the unit – academic staff, qualified professional practitioners, demonstrators/technicians and research students.
